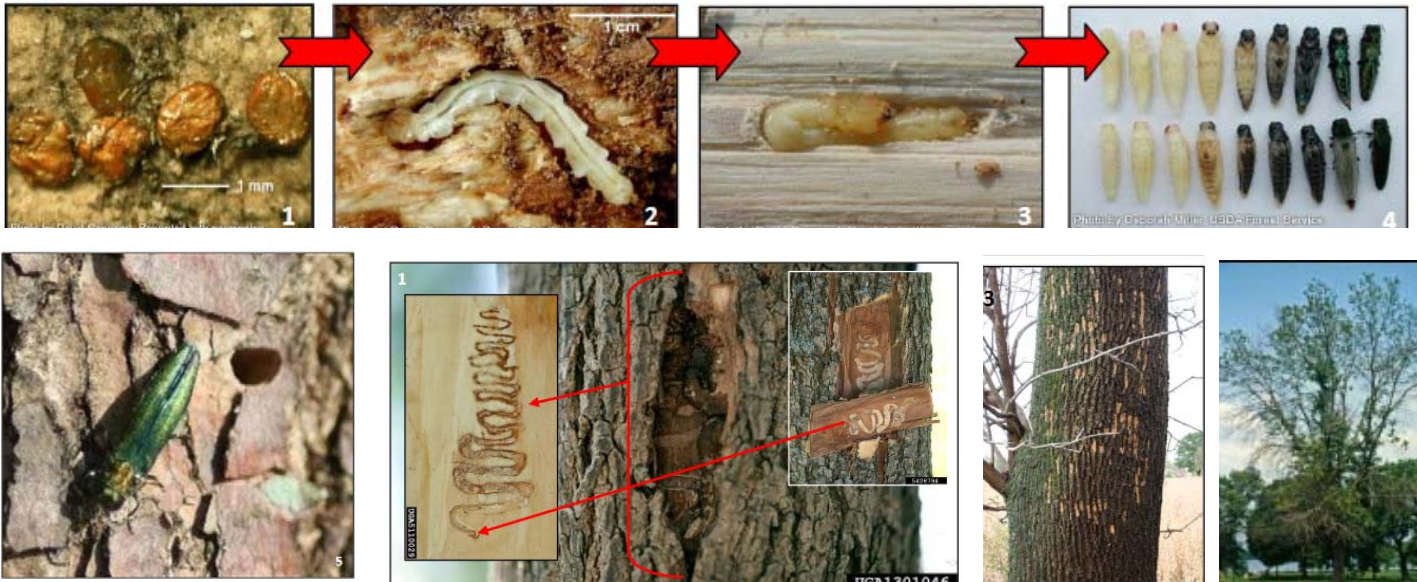


This **ASH TREE** is at risk of being killed by the **Emerald Ash Borer**



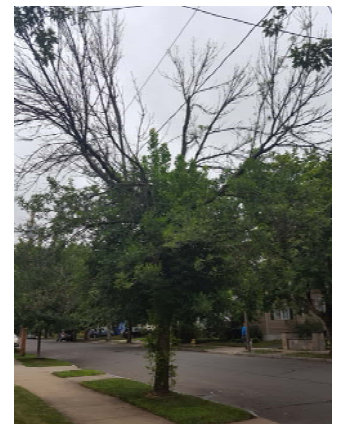
Over a period of one to two years the tree may lose its canopy and become brittle with dropping branches.

In order to reduce the spread we are posting all Ash Trees that show significant signs of infestation for removal . Trees with only early warning signs can be saved and monitored for the time being. Trees that have progressed will still need removal. To request the tree be considered for monitor status please object to removal by emailing flage@newhavenct.gov Residents can also opt to adopt the treatment of the Ash by selecting a certified arborist (<https://ctpa.org/find-arborist/>) and completing the adoption form to allow us to keep track of those treated <https://www.newhavenct.gov/civicax/filebank/blobdload.aspx?blobid=28187>. Please note, treating must occur annually and does not guarantee survival.
